

Protect Yourself



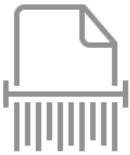
HANG UP!

Common Scams

- You have NOT won a sweepstakes or lottery you don't remember entering.
- You NEVER have to pay anything up front to claim a prize.
- Your friend that is out of the country on vacation does NOT need you to send them money to replace their passport.
- The IRS is NOT going to send you notice that you might be due a refund.
- NEVER give out personal information to anyone over the phone concerning health care.
- Home repair scams will use words like "repair people", "cash only", and "have extra supplies".
- Watch for payday loans asking for money upfront.
- Dating websites responses that ask you for money.



Scams are nothing new. The motive doesn't change; JUST THE METHOD!

Scammers Goals

The scammer uses emotional triggers to entrap the victim.

With emotions so engaged, logic and reason go out the window.

If you have a cell phone or telephone, get mail, have a computer, or a front door,

YOU ARE A TARGET!

Be Smart/Be Safe

1. Report the scam to law enforcement.
2. Be aware! You'll probably be contacted again. The scammers aren't going to give up easily.

They will keep trying!

If you have already been victimized, don't feel ashamed or embarrassed. You have become one of the 50 million adults who will fall prey to the scammers this year.
